New Battleground State Poll Finds 56% of Americans Prefer A “New Way Forward” on the Economy

Full toplines & crosstabs follow this summary memo.

Survey Methodology: This CFFE PAC survey is based on 1,098 interviews conducted October 23-29, 2024 by YouGov on the internet of registered voters in the states of Arizona, Georgia, Michigan, Nevada, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin. The sample was weighted according to gender, age, race/ethnicity, education, and U.S. Census region based on voter registration lists, the U.S. Census American Community Survey, and the U.S. Census Current Population Survey, as well as 2020 Presidential vote. Respondents were selected from YouGov to be representative of registered voters. The margin of error is +/- 3.3%.

Key Findings:

- **When it comes to the economy, 56% of voters prefer “a new way forward”,** while only 31% want “a return to how things were in the past.” 84% of Democrats, 45% of Independents and 29% of Republicans want a new way forward.
- **Vice President Harris has a 4% lead** over Former President Trump (50-46%).
- **Democrats have a 3 point advantage on which party has the right approach on the economy (49-46).** Republicans had a 5 point advantage (42-37) in a similar battleground state [poll fielded by the Winning Jobs Narrative in February](#).
- Since February’s survey, **Democrats have increased their trust over Republicans on six key economic issues**, like “strengthening the middle class” and “putting hardworking people first.” [See chart on page 2]
- **Americans are split on what to blame for rising costs**, with 50% faulting too much government spending and 50% faulting corporate greed, which is a net 3% swing toward corporate greed since February.
- **59% believe we should invest in policies that lower costs and raise incomes** for working people compared to 41% who want to keep taxes low for everyone.
- **76% say they made their choice in the Presidential election because they think that candidate will do a better job on the economy.** Inflation is ranked as the #1 issue facing the US today, with immigration second, and jobs and the economy 3rd.

We collected interviews via text-to-web and online panel between February 9-18, 2024. The margin of error for a sample of this size is +/- 3.1 percentage points at the 95% level of confidence.

This survey is based on 1,098 interviews conducted by YouGov on the internet of registered voters in the states of Arizona, Georgia, Michigan, Nevada, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin. The sample was weighted according to gender, age, race/ethnicity, education, and U.S. Census region based on voter registration lists, the U.S. Census American Community Survey, and the U.S. Census Current Population Survey, as well as 2020 Presidential vote. Respondents were selected from YouGov to be representative of registered voters. The weights range from 0.25 to 4.86 with a mean of 1 and a standard deviation of 0.48.

The margin of error (a 95% confidence interval) for a sample percentage p based upon the subsetting sample is approximately 3.3%. It is calculated using the formula:

$$\hat{p} \pm 100 \times \sqrt{\frac{1 + CV^2}{n}}$$

where CV is the coefficient of variation of the sample weights and n is the sample size used to compute the proportion. This is a measure of sampling error (the average of all estimates obtained using the same sample selection and weighting procedures repeatedly). The sample estimate should differ from its expected value by less than margin of error in 95 percent of all samples. It does not reflect non-sampling errors, including potential selection bias in panel participation or in response to a particular survey.

This survey is based on 1,098 interviews conducted by YouGov on the internet of registered voters in the states of Arizona, Georgia, Michigan, Nevada, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin. The sample was weighted according to gender, age, race/ethnicity, education, and U.S. Census region based on voter registration lists, the U.S. Census American Community Survey, and the U.S. Census Current Population Survey, as well as 2020 Presidential vote. Respondents were selected from YouGov to be representative of registered voters. The weights range from 0.25 to 4.86 with a mean of 1 and a standard deviation of 0.48.

YouGov Blue

The margin of error (a 95% confidence interval) for a sample percentage p based upon the subsetting sample is approximately 3.3%. It is calculated using the formula:

$$\hat{p} \pm 100 \times \sqrt{\frac{1 + CV^2}{n}}$$

where CV is the coefficient of variation of the sample weights and n is the sample size used to compute the proportion. This is a measure of sampling error (the average of all estimates obtained using the same sample selection and weighting procedures repeatedly). The sample estimate should differ from its expected value by less than margin of error in 95 percent of all samples. It does not reflect non-sampling errors, including potential selection bias in panel participation or in response to a particular survey.
